Town of Kansas Marker Dedicated

The Town of Kansas historic marker was dedicated by the Native Sons and Daughters June 3rd. The event was held on the 160th anniversary of the chartering of the Town of Kansas. Master of ceremonies, Honorable Tom Sims, introduced the speakers. Speakers included Mayor Mark Funkhouser, former Kansas City, Missouri, City Manager Bob Collins, Kansas City, Missouri, Councilwoman Joanne Collins, Westport Historical Society Treasurer Dan Smith, Jackson County Historical Society President Dan Jackson, Native Sons and Daughters Marker Committee Chairman Roger Smith, and Past Native Sons and Daughters President Joe Vaughan. Approximately 75 attended the event.

The marker is located near the southeast corner of the pedestrian bridge at 1st Street and Main Street in downtown Kansas City, Missouri.

The dedication of this marker represents a milestone in the effort to commemorate the Town of Kansas site and the 12-year efforts of Toms Sims in advocating for the commemoration of the Town of Kansas site, and the research for the marker's narrative.

Majors House Event Attracts 140

On July 10th, 140 people gathered at the Alexander Majors House to promote his life and achievements and showcase the Alexander Majors House at 83rd and State Line, in Kansas City, Missouri. This event provided an opportunity for our community to support the preservation of this historic site and to promote the contributions of Alexander Majors to our nation's heritage.



President Gary Hicks conducted the evening's events, with member Ross Marshall presenting Majors' history, followed by Dan Sturdevant's 3-D's *Cowboy Band* performing western song favorites. Ashley Marker Dedication

On Thursday, May 21, the Native Sons and Daughters dedicated a marker near the southeast corner of 55th Street and Brookside Boulevard in Kansas City, Missouri. The event was attended by approximately 75.

This marker commemorates James and Pamela Ashley's efforts to preserve the 1870's railroad right-of-way as a walking, jogging, and bicycling trail. Mr. Ashley's vision made it possible for future utilization of the corridor for rail passenger service.

The dedication ceremony, conducted by President Gary Hicks, included remarks by 1st Vice-President Norm Besheer representing the Kansas City Area Transportation Authority R-O-W Committee. Mr. Jerry Riffel, Counsel to the KCATA, remarked on the history of the Country Club Street Car Line. Whitney Kerr, project chair, reflected on the Ashley's determination to preserve the right-of-way. Whitney led a two-year effort to have the marker and its narrative placed. Pamela Ashley offered remarks on behalf of the family. Jan Marcason, 4th district representative, paid tribute to the Ashleys and the KCATA for working to bring the Trolley track trail to the city.

Truman Maquette Statue

The Native Sons and Daughters are working to permanently place the sculptured maquette statue of Harry Truman at the Jackson County Courthouse. The maquette was created several years ago in order to place a large bronze statue on the vacant pedestal on the south side of the Union Station façade. The project has changed, but the maquette is available. Once a display case is constructed, the maquette will be relocated from storage to the Courthouse. We're looking forward to seeing it in place later this year.

Tour to Independence, Vaile Mansion, Courthouse on October 9

A tour of Independence is scheduled for Saturday, October 9th. Invitations, with details, will be sent soon. We will meet at Independence Square at 10:00 a.m. and finish the tour at 4:00 p.m.

The tour includes a special behind-the-scenes tour of the Jackson County Courthouse in Independence, the restored Alton-Chicago Train Depot, and the Vaile Mansion for a tour and high tea. Please plan on joining us.

50 Attend Grinter Marker Rededication

On May 15th, The Native Sons and Daughters toured the Grinter House, the oldest unaltered building in Wyandotte County, Kansas. During construction at the Grinter House in Kansas City, Kansas, the marker erected by the Native Sons and Daughters was put in storage. Unfortunately, the storage location was lost, and the marker went missing for many years. Dan Sturdevant's efforts to locate the marker were successful, and the marker was located, re-erected, and re-dedicated. 50 attended the event, with lunch provided by the Lions Club and Grinter Friends.

In 1831, Moses Grinter established the first ferry on the Kansas River at a site named Delaware Crossing. In 1857, Grinter began building a Kentucky-style home using brick, mortar, and lumber produced on site.

Ziegler Speaks at Boone Family Meeting

The Boone family met at the Intercontinental Hotel on the Plaza Hotel June 10th. Grandchildren, great-grandchildren, and other Boone descendents attended and heard Native Sons and Daughter member Herb Zigler present his research on Boone.

Member Tom Sims also highlighted the work of George Hicks and the Native Sons and Daughters in revitalizing Boone-Hays Park. Ziegler presented a photo of George at the park.

In addition, the group heard about Nathan Boone's purchase of the land of the Osage Indians and the founding of Fort Osage. The Native Sons and Daughters were instrumental in the rehabilitation of the Fort in the 1960s.

Bylaw Changes Adopted

On July 20th, a special meeting was held at the Trailside Center, in Kansas City, Missouri, to review and adopt changes and modifications of the organization's bylaws.

The overhaul of the bylaws, is now complete with their adoption by a quorum of the membership. Updating our bylaws helps to support the leadership of the organization, provide a better understanding of the operations of the organization and its board, and clarifies duties and responsibilities of the offices of the organization. 
