A BILL

To amend the Social Security Act to include special districts in the coronavirus relief fund, to direct the Secretary to include special districts as an eligible issuer under the Municipal Liquidity Facility, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Special Districts Provide Essential Services Act".

SEC. 2. INCLUSION OF SPECIAL DISTRICTS IN THE CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND.

- (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 601(a) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 801(a)) is amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:
 - "(3) FUNDS FOR SPECIAL DISTRICTS.—If an amount in excess of \$150,000,000,000 is appropriated for payments made under this section, special districts shall be eligible for payments out of such excess amount in accordance with subsection (c)(6).".
- (b) AMOUNT FOR SPECIAL DISTRICTS.—Section 601(c) of the Social Security Act ($\underline{42~U.S.C.}$ 801(c)) is amended—
 - (1) by redesignating paragraphs (6) through (8) as paragraphs (7) through (9), respectively; and
 - (2) by inserting after paragraph (5) the following new paragraph:
 - "(6) SPECIAL DISTRICTS.—If a portion of any excess amount described in subsection (a)(3) is allocated to a State, such State shall allocate at least 5 percent of that amount for special districts in that State for distribution at such State's discretion, not later than 60 days after such State has received such funds."
- (c) DEFINITION OF SPECIAL DISTRICT.—Section 601(g) of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 801(g)) is amended—
 - (1) by redesignating paragraphs (4) through (5) as paragraphs (5) through (6), respectively; and
 - (2) by inserting after paragraph (3) the following new paragraph:
 - "(4) SPECIAL DISTRICT.—The term 'special district' means a political subdivision, formed pursuant to general law or special act of a State, for the purpose of performing one or more governmental or proprietary functions.".
- (d) UPDATE TO GUIDANCE.—The Secretary of the Treasury shall update any guidance issued with respect to the Coronavirus Relief Fund established under section 601 of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 801) to reflect the inclusion of special districts as eligible for payments from amounts in excess of \$150,000,000,000 appropriated under such section.

SEC. 3. INCLUDING SPECIAL DISTRICTS IN THE MUNICIPAL LIQUIDITY FACILITY.

The Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System shall include special districts as eligible issuers in the Municipal Liquidity Facility program authorized under section 13(3) of the Federal Reserve Act.

Bill Introduced to Include Special Districts in Federal COVID-19 Relief

The California Special Districts Association is proud to support a bill introduced Monday that would provide special districts across the United States access to federal relief measures to assist state and local governments with unforeseen budgetary hardship resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Congressman John Garamendi, D-Calif., introduced HR 7073, the "Special Districts Provide Essential Services Act," which would give special districts access to key resources available to local governments under the CARES Act, including the Coronavirus Relief Fund and the Federal Reserve's Municipal Liquidity Facilities program.

Special districts are local governments created by a community to deliver specialized services – such as critical infrastructure, first response and community enrichment services – that are essential to residents' health, safety, economy, and well-being. Approximately 30,000 special districts across the country continue to serve millions of Americans and respond to needs within their communities while

facing the constraints of the pandemic.

"Special districts in California and across the nation have been financially strained due to COVID-19 and have been excluded from much-needed federal relief," said Neil McCormick, CEO with the California Special Districts Association (CSDA). "The Special Districts Provide Essential Services Act will help thousands of these specialized local governments to continue to provide important infrastructure, first response and other critical local services for millions of Americans through this pandemic. The aid will help special districts continue to focus on preparing for emergencies we know inevitably are ahead, like wildfires and Public Safety Power Shutoffs. CSDA proudly supports the bill and thanks Congressman Garamendi for spearheading this effort."

The legislation would require a state to distribute no less than five percent of any future Coronavirus Relief Fund monies received by the state to in each respective state within 60 days of receiving the resources. The bill would also authorize the Federal Reserve to consider special districts as "eligible issuers" for its Municipal Liquidity Facilities program to purchase suitable municipal bond and revenue anticipation notes.

Lastly, the bill establishes a definition of "special district", which currently does not exist in federal statute: "The term 'special district' means a political subdivision, formed pursuant to general law or special act of a state, for the purpose of performing one or more governmental or proprietary functions."

The bill has earned the endorsement of CSDA and a national coalition of state special districts associations in Colorado, Florida, Oregon and Utah. A coalition of <u>12 special districts stakeholder organizations in California</u> also endorse the Special Districts Provide Essential Services Act.

CSDA will continue to work with state and national coalition partners to represent the needs of special districts at the state and federal level. H.R. 7073 would help the [your district name] meet the challenges of COVID-19 by:

- Allowing special districts access to the Coronavirus Relief Fund. Under the bill, states would be required to allocate no less than 5 percent of future Coronavirus Relief Fund disbursements to special districts. Doing so remedies deep concerns and uncertainty surrounding special districts' future access to much-needed assistance for unforeseen COVID-19-related expenditures and revenue loss. Even with the Fund's allocation under the CARES Act, many states have not yet released their portion of the Fund to local governments, including here in California. Designating special districts as eligible for the Fund would greatly assist districts in their attempts to both recoup revenue losses and backfill the increase in expenditures many have experienced due to a variety of pandemic-related expenses (PPE, etc.), which totals an estimated \$250 million through May 5 for California's special districts.
- Permitting special districts to be considered "eligible issuers" of the Federal Reserve
 Board's Municipal Liquidity Facility (MLF). The Federal Reserve established the MLF as a tool to
 use funds provided in the CARES Act to purchase bonds and revenue anticipation notes to support
 States and some local governments experiencing financial stress. Despite special districts' authority
 to issue these notes, they were not included as "eligible issuers" under the MLF. H.R. 7073
 corrects this omission and makes special districts "eligible issuers" for purposes of the MLF as well.

• **Defines "special district".** Currently, a federal definition for "special district" does not exist. The bill would establish the term as a "political subdivision, formed pursuant to general law or special act of a State, for the purpose of performing one or more governmental or proprietary functions."

As Congress continues to negotiate next steps for COVID-19 relief for state and local governments, the [your district name] not only asks for your support on this bill in the U.S. House but also its provisions' inclusion in the Senate's version of a state and local relief bill.
