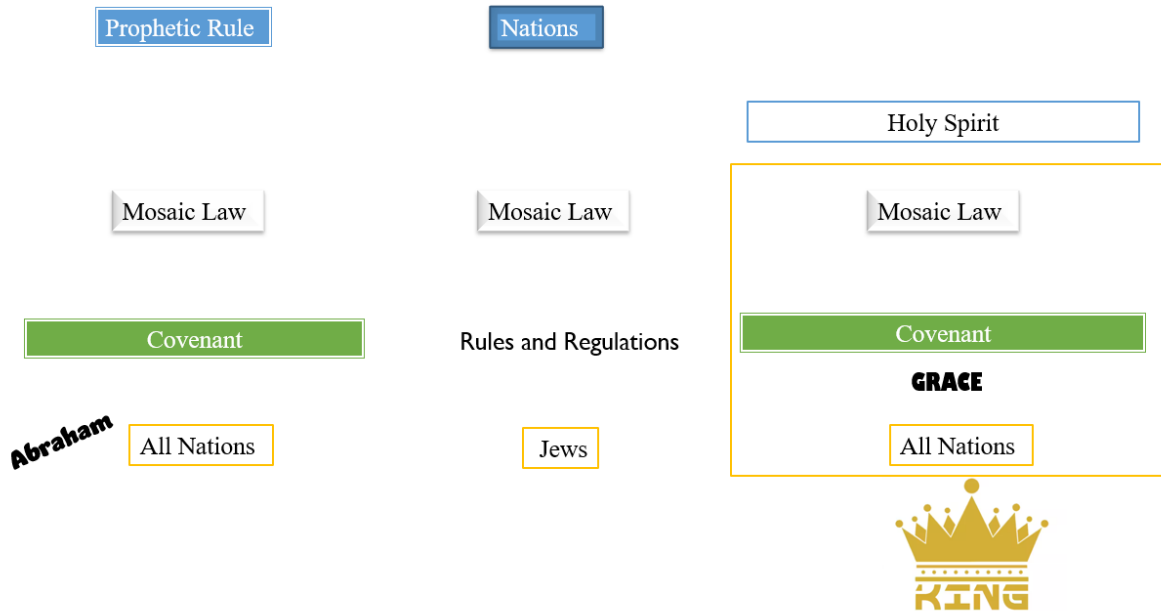

2) Chronicle of the Temple Destruction

- First temple: 1000 BCE: Solomon Temple

- 1st Destruction: 586 BCE: Nebuchadnezzar

- Second temple: 538 BCE: Rebuilt the temple, Hezekia (2 Chro. 36:22-23; Ezra 1:1-4)

- 2nd Destruction: 70 AD: Titus’ army; Simon Zealot(?)

Sanhedrin

The Sanhedrin was a Jewish court of law in the time of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem, as well as a system of smaller Jewish courts throughout the land of Israel that existed until 425 C.E. The term "Sanhedrin" means "council" in Hebrew. Sanhedrin ha-Gadol was comprised of seventy-one rabbis

Exodus 18:21–22, Numbers 11:16–17, 11:24–25; Deuteronomy 1:15–18, 17:9–12

Moses and the Israelites were commanded by God to establish courts of judges who were given full authority over the people of Israel, who were commanded by God through Moses to obey the judgments made by the courts and every Torah-abiding law they established.

The Sanhedrin was led by a president called “nasi (lit. ‘prince’)
