Highlights from Fall 2020

- ❖ We have had 40 Gospel conversations this semester. This is behind what we would normally be hoping to have but with the Covid restrictions on campus I am thankful for what we have been able to do so far.
- ❖ 50 BCM students involved in weekly BCM activities.
- The BCM/Hebron Baptist ministry to Gateway Community College is still going strong under the leadership of Allen Greene!
- ❖ 40 students trained in evangelism through multiple outreach methods.

Ways to Help

- ❖ Bring on a Campus Ministry Intern (CMI) who will help your church reach the students in your area. We are able to train this intern to be self-funding through ministry partner development.
- Start a ministry from your church to a local, unengaged campus. The KBC will support you to bring on a Campus Ministry Leader (CML) who will be a staff member for your church and lead your college ministry.
- Help provide scholarships for students to attend conferences and mission trips.
- Financial support. This will enable us to continue reaching lost students at NKU and our other local campuses.

It has been a very unusual school year so far but we see the Lord at work here at NKU. The Covid-19 regulations prevent us from having large meetings, public gatherings on campus (like our evangelistic survey booth), travel to events/conferences off campus, and most social events. Thankfully, we are still allowed to use the BCM building providing we do not exceed 50 people in attendance and that we social distance and wear masks. The BCM building has always been great to have but with the way things are right now we would be able to do very little without it. Thank you as always for your partnership in the Cooperative Program. The Baptist Student Center building at NKU, the BCM ministry, and my own position would not exist without your support.

One thing I am excited about this year is how we are running our student led Bible studies. Normally we would do a video series or book study during those study times but this year we decided to change things up. We are now using the Discovery Bible study method, a very simple study style designed to be used with non-believers. Though our Bible study groups are largely comprised of believers, our vision is that they can learn how easy these groups are to lead and begin to launch new Discovery groups with lost friends. I have seen first hand how effective and exciting this style of Bible study can be when done with those that have little or no exposure to the scriptures. Our hope is that the 40 students active in weekly Bible study will each begin to make new disciples through this method this school year.

Please be in prayer for us to continue to be bold in sharing the Gospel with students through on campus Gospel conversations. Pray that students will start up Discovery Bible studies with their lost friends. Pray also for continued protection from Covid and that further restrictions will not be placed on student organizations like BCM so that we can be unhindered in the ministry we are called to. Whatever else comes our way, BCM will continue to be about Knowing Christ and making Him known on our campus!

MAKING OUR MISSION MATTER

Ministry looks different this year – BUT we are continuing to reach out and share the Love of Jesus.

In place of our children and youth programs we are passing out packages weekly. Currently we are delivering to 41 families, with a total of 107 children and youth. The packages include a snack, drink, craft, prize bag and a message of God's Love. We also provide some type of grocery item each week to help the whole family. The consistency of showing up week after week to these families has been powerful. Not only do the kids and youth notice, but also their parents. For some, the consistency shows just as much love as the packages.

Our Simply Dinners still happened, but in a different way. Seven of the NKBA churches helped with this ministry. Thanks to each who helped! The meals were packed into to-go containers and families were able to pick-up for their household. With a total of 937 meals, more meals were served this year than any other summer through the Simply Dinner Ministry. Not only was it a blessing to those we served, but even the neighbors noticed. What a blessing that the neighbors can see the love that is being given out at our ministry center.

The yearly giveaways are still so important and we are making them work, but again they operate differently. This year, with our Back to School Day ministry we had it over a 3-day period instead of a 3-hour session. We still gave out the same items to those in need, but just had to do it with less volunteers. Thankfully we had a mission team (the only mission team we had this summer) package up the hygiene items and school supplies so that we could make it a quicker experience, while still loving on those that we ministered to.

People have been calling for a few months now about Thanksgiving and Christmas. Each of these ministries will have to be adjusted to be able to meet the needs, but it will all come together. For the Thanksgiving Giveaway, we are planning to have various scheduled pickup times and maybe even a few deliveries. If you would like to help with the pickup times that will be at the center or you would like to help with deliveries please let me know as soon as possible.

For the Christmas Giveaway we are planning to have multiple worship services with smaller numbers of people in the sanctuary at a time, so we can spread out more, and then give out the food, toys and clothes. If you are interested in helping with the collection of food, toys and clothes please contact me early November. If you are interested in helping with the actual giveaway just let me know soon.

Our signup day for Thanksgiving and Christmas is November 6th. We have no idea how much need will be out there, but I do know that with the NKBA churches we have a great source of help in meeting these needs. Thank you ahead of time for this help.

Ministry is different right now, but it continues to make a difference. It continues to matter!

Please continue to pray for us as we move forward. Pray for the families we are reaching. Pray for the packages we give out to be seen as a message of God's Love. Pray for the meals we are still trying to do on a monthly basis. Pray for the giveaways as we provide for the physical needs, but also that God will open the hearts of people to their spiritual needs. Pray for the backpack ministry. We are still going to provide this ministry. Pray about if you can volunteer. Pray for us to come up with more ways of reaching out to our community.

MAKING OUR MISSION MATTER! That is my heart's desire!

The reason all this can happen is because the partnership with NKBA churches. Let's continue MAKING OUR MISSION MATTER!

DOM REPORT November 2020

It is a joy to serve our churches of the NKBA on mission with Jesus. Our mission (<u>What are we doing?</u>) statement indicates <u>"The NKBA is an association of catalytic churches uniting together to accomplish the life-changing, world-changing mission of Jesus. We exist to <u>EMPOWER churches to accomplish Christ's mission to "make disciples" (Matthew 28:19), and <u>"to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10).</u> The NKBA partners with the local churches to equip, resource, and catalyze the God-given vision for the local church.</u></u>

Our vision (<u>Where are we going</u>?) is to develop a healthy culture and network of catalytic churches that take The Gospel to EVERY HOME in our Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and around the world (Acts 1:8). We believe healthy reproducing churches are passionate about reaching EACH ONE in their communities to live in the rescuing power of the Gospel and to do whatever it takes (within the boundaries of Scripture) to accomplish that. The aim of the NKBA is to create a culture of Christ-Centered, Gospel focused catalytic churches.

Demographics show that over 577,000 people live within a ten-mile radius of the NKBA office. The North American Mission Board (NAMB) statistics tell us that 68% of Boone County, 75% of Campbell County, and 85% of Kenton County are un-churched/de-churched/un-reached/spiritually LOST.

To accomplish this mission our core values are: (Why we are doing it?):

<u>FOUND PEOPLD FIND PEOPLE.</u> This shared value guides our decision of GOING over STAYING to reach "THE ONE" (Matthew 28:19-20). It is disobedient to God to not be constantly in search of "THE ONE" (Luke 15).

SAVED PEOPLE SERVE PEOPLE. This shared value guides <u>our decision to SERVICE over SELF</u>. Our primary concern is for "THE ONE" who is lost (Luke 19:10), so we do whatever is needed to meet people where they are at their point of need and guide them lovingly to "THE ONE" who is THE WAY, THE TRUTH, and THE LIFE (Matthew 23:11).

<u>LOVED PEOPLE LISTEN TO GOD AND TO PEOPLE.</u> This value guides our decisions to value <u>TRUTH over TRADITION</u>. A healthy disciple is one who actively listens to the hurts of people, actively listens to God and HIS WORD, then LIVES IN OBEDIENCE to that TRUTH by doing whatever is necessary to follow Jesus and to become more like Him! (James 1:22-25)

ENGAGED PEOPLE ENGAGE WITH PEOPLE. This value guides our decisions to <u>value INTIMACY</u> <u>over ACTIVITY</u>. Our engagement is always driven by our mission to "make disciples" which means developing relationships with people that lead to LIFE CHANGE. Life change happens best in groups (Sunday School, Small groups, neighborhood groups, house churches, etc....). We must be DRIVEN as churches to constantly be focused on taking the church to our neighborhoods instead of waiting for them to come to us. Local churches MUST BE OUTWARDLY FOCUSED or will die (Dead Sea).

CHANGED PEOPLE CHANGE THE WORLD ONE STORY AT A TIME, ONE LIFE AT A TIME. This value of CHANGED LIVES guides our decisions to intentionally <u>seek UNITY over UNIFORMITY and do whatever it takes to reach "THE ONE" in our community</u> and TELL THE STORY OF CHRIST, HOW HE HAS CHANGED OUR LIVES AND HOW HE CAN CHANGE THE LIFE OF "THE ONE". It is essential to intentionally build relational bridges with neighborhoods, families, schools to reach people who are lost and searching. Our story and mission are always constant; our methodology varies to include anything within the bounds of scripture to reach "THE ONE."

To provide some framework for these core values, the B.L.E.S.S. strategy (<u>How are we doing</u> <u>it?</u>)

B= BEGIN with PRAYER. Nothing happens until we pray. (I Thess. 5:17)

L= LISTEN to God...His Word...to people and their hurts. (Exodus 18:19)

E= ENGAGE Intentionally/Missionally. Connect with people outside the walls of our churches, moving the church from their seats to the streets to connect with the hurts and needs of our communities. (Matthew 18:19-20)

S= SERVE people unconditionally. (Colossians 3:13)

S= STORY...GO and TELL of how Christ has changed your life and how He alone can change the trajectory of lives.

In 2020, a renewal for prayer for and among Pastors has been an ongoing effort. To pray for and with one another as Pastors and for the lostness of our communities. Nearly everything that was "planned" for 2020 was set aside as we worked toward flexibility and adapting to the pandemic and the impact on our churches and communities.

*Ministry continued through our church plants to reach Asians (Korean and Chinese), African Immigrants, Hispanics, and Burmese as well as many others who were stranded due to COVID-19 at NKY through the excellent work of BCM and WMU.

*Tens of thousands were fed by the NKBA and our partnerships with our churches, highlighting The Cornerstone Fellowship, First Baptist Covington 9th Street and their HOPE Ministry, Main Street Church, and Oak Ridge Baptist Church.

*The NKBA also helped lives who were transformed by tragedies in Nashville and in Louisiana. We have consistently reached out beyond our Jerusalem to work with our existing partners.

*The NKBA assisted churches receive in excess of \$400,000 through the Payroll Protection Program in a difficult season to help churches and staffs.

*The NKBA worked to provide a comprehensive list of resources and a 90-day grid to help churches plan in the midst of COVID-19.

*The NKBA provided counseling resources to pastors, staff, and their families during this difficult season. Tools have been provided to help begin Backyard Bible Clubs to reach children, PRAY AND GO, to go and pray throughout our communities in preparation to join the KBC in their emphasis to take THE GOSPEL TO EVERY HOME in 2021. More information, training and resources will be available as we look ahead to 2021.
