SCRIPTURE LESSONS: OLD TESTAMENT LESSON – GENESIS 4:1-15

4:¹ Now Adam knew Eve his wife, and she conceived and bore Cain, saying, "I have gotten a man with the help of the Lord." ² And again, she bore his brother Abel. Now Abel was a keeper of sheep, and Cain a worker of the ground. ³ In the course of time Cain brought to the Lord an offering of the fruit of the ground, ⁴ and Abel also brought of the firstborn of his flock and of their fat portions. And the Lord had regard for Abel and his offering, ⁵ but for Cain and his offering he had no regard. So Cain was very angry, and his face fell. ⁶ The Lord said to Cain, "Why are you angry, and why has your face fallen? ¹ If you do well, will you not be accepted? APOSTLE'S CREED (CONFESSION OF FAITH) [PAGE 12]

SERMON: THE RIGHTEOUSNESS OF FAITH IN CHRIST VERSUS THE RIGHTEOUSNESS OF DOING – LK. 18:9-14

Let your words be those of the penitent tax collector: "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (Lk. 18:13) Amen.

Dear baptized in the Name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. The Pharisee and the tax collector both pray to the same God. Each one tells God about himself. The Pharisee thanks God that he's not like others – especially the rotten, good-for-nothing tax collector. The tax collector confesses to God that he's a sinner. Each says something about himself. What do you say about yourself?

Frankly, there's a secret part of us that wants God to be beholden to us – to kindly regard us because of who we are and what we do. That same somewhat well-hidden part of us also wants the Church to be about us, life to center on us. We want our families to revolve around us. We want the freeway to part like the Red Sea once we enter the onramp. We want others to see just how good and important we are.

And so we all secretly want the Church service to revolve around us; to focus on who we are; what we want. Preachers want to use the pulpit to show their congregations just how good they are at preaching. More than a few of us preachers seek affirmation and praise, desiring to endear ourselves to our hearers by way of flattery, humor or going light on preaching the Law. Sermon-hearers in turn want to receive praise from the pulpit. Even now there's a part of you that would like me to praise your general wonderfulness before God. But what's really true about us; what can we honestly say about ourselves? Should we speak like the Pharisee, or the tax collector?

The Pharisee speaks of his gifts and good works. There's no reason to think that his claims are lies or exaggerations. He's truly done the things of which he boasts before God. They really are good works in the sense that they conform to God's will. This man is upstanding. It's good not to be like open sinners who have no concern for God and His holy commandments. Our Lord Himself teaches us about fasting, giving an offering, adultery, injustice, etc. Jesus doesn't want to condemn good works and pious living. But He does want to show that they are not the righteousness by which we can stand before a just and holy God. In short, Jesus depicts for us in these two men the righteousness of works and the righteousness of faith – the righteousness of doing and the righteousness of passively receiving godly, saving gifts. The righteousness of doing exalts itself before God. The righteousness of faith confesses one's sinfulness and seeks Christ's righteousness given as a redeeming gift through His blood.

The righteousness of doing is the highest, most holy thing in the eyes of the world, and yet before God it is condemned. Two chapters before Jesus' Parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector, He tells the Pharisees: "You are those who justify yourselves before men, but God knows your hearts. For what is exalted among men is an abomination in the sight of God." (Lk. 16:15) St. Paul speaks the same Word of the Lord in Galatians 2:16: "A person is not justified by works of the Law but through faith in Jesus Christ, so we also have believed in Christ Jesus, in order to be justified by faith in Christ and not by works of the Law, because by works of the Law no one will be justified." The righteousness of faith, however, goes unseen by men, and yet before God it is called perfect and pleases Him. For "without faith it is impossible to please God." (Heb. 11:6)

How then should we speak of ourselves today? Should we extol our virtues as the Pharisee did his? I think that would be most unwise and wrong-headed of us. It's been said that the Church of God is a hospital for sinners. Maybe, like me, you're not particularly fond of hospitals — especially having to be admitted to one yourself. We make it our goal to stay out of and far away from the ER and the hospital bed. But what about when we need the emergency room or to be admitted to fight a severe infection with antibiotics or when heart troubles threaten us? Then there's really no other, better place for us, is there? Then we're only too glad to be under the care of physicians and nurses.

When some Pharisees were bitter at Jesus for eating with sinners and tax collectors – people whom they considered to be the scum of the earth – Jesus answered them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick [do.] I have not come to call the righteous but sinners to repentance." (Lk. 5:31-32) We have no need of our Good Physician's skillful care for us in the hospital of His holy Church if our sins are slight or basically non-existent. If our good works and good name profit us before God, raise us up to Him, then we've bypassed Jesus and really have no need for a sin-forgiving Savior. Then we might as well already be in heaven. But it's really nothing like that, is it? Not even close!

You're not here today because you're great people before God, holier than others and closer to Jesus than most. You're here because you're a sinner, joining a group of sinners, who flee to the righteousness of Christ so that we don't die and face certain condemnation, but stand before God in hope and joy. And when I say that you – just like me – are a sinner, I don't mean that lightly, as in, you're far from perfect, but that you're still a pretty good person, far less guilty and unclean that your average Joe. I mean it in a profound, sad sense. Our sins result in death, which is no small thing. You won't suffer a slight case of death or die just a little. Even before that, the offense we cause others by our unkind words and deeds, the repulsive things which we think are not moderately bad. They give us only suffering, death, hell! The world can be bought off and fooled by the righteousness of doing. But God, Who sees the heart, can't be.

Christian author and apologist C.S. Lewis once said: "If you want a religion that will make you comfortable, I don't recommend Christianity." Very true! It comes to this: Do we go up to God's House so that we can say and hear how great we are, or do we come into the sanctuary of the Lord because of how great our need is? Probably no one is ever really comfortable in a hospital, and yet hospitals are always full because people know their need.

The Pharisee has no need. He wants to say and hear only good things about himself. Many people are like him, though they insist to the nth degree that they're not. They may even confess that they're sinners. But they don't want to hear about it and be rebuked and corrected. They don't want to be made uncomfortable. They don't want to have to bear with the sinner in the pew behind them or the sinner in the pulpit in front of them. They don't want to amend their lives and change. "Of course the preacher has to preach against sins," they say, "but his words are more for sinners worse off than us." We're all the worst off of all!

We're all fine with the preacher preaching against moral decay in society. But when he speaks God's Word to our faces – "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet" (Rom. 13:9) – and says further that we're guilty of breaking these commandments and more, we chafe, we bristle, we push back. But we are, each one of us, guilty of transgressing God's holy Law unto death, and we can't deny it or say otherwise. We greedily desire what's not ours. We take it if we can. We treat others poorly – oftentimes those closest to us – when they disagree or quarrel with us, and when they don't act like we want them to. We stray with our eyes from the spouse of our youth. It's easy to say that we're sinners. But we don't want anyone – especially we ourselves, and God most of all – to think of us this way.

For decades now, Churches of the West – including us Lutherans – have been gradually abandoning the holy liturgy of the Church, which she has embraced for many centuries – in favor of a more emotional, man-centered way of worship. We – and all Churches, really – can't afford to abandon the divine liturgy because it makes us keep the Church service focused on the Holy Trinity and Christ Jesus in particular. The liturgy has us see how we've offended our Holy God, deserve nothing but death and His wrath forever, and yet receive nothing but the forgiveness of sins, saving grace and blessing-after-blessing from our gracious God! Where we'd like the service to be about us – as is the case with much of American Christianity, the historic liturgy keeps our eyes and hearts on Christ and His cross. Where we'd like to hear and say only good things about ourselves, it compels us to confess our sins and to flee to Christ – Who died for us – in order to receive His mercy and refuge. Where we'd like to do the talking, the liturgy has our Lord do the speaking. Where we'd focus on our goodness and works, it keeps us focused on Christ's gifts of Word and Water, His body and blood.

The surprising joy is that the tax collector – a true and hurting sinner – goes home justified. He returns with a clean conscience that doesn't have to ask the question: "Have I done enough to please God?" For all our wanting life to be about us, how great we are and how unique our troubles are, when we finally put that aside and humble ourselves, we discover the good news that God has loved us all along. He has loved us before and apart from our works, worth and troubles – all for Jesus' sake since He saw our great need and had compassion.

So if that's you; if your need is great, then rejoice. Jesus is all things to you. If you are sick, He's your Physician. If you're empty, He's your Fullness. If you're burdened with sins, He's Your Righteousness, Forgiveness and Peace with God. If you're lonely, He's your Dwelling Place. If you're scared and need help, He's your Refuge and Strength, a very present Help. If you fear death, He's your Life. If you desire heaven, He's Your Way there. If you're lost in the darkness, He's your Light. If you're hungry, He's your Bread from heaven. (St. Ambrose)

Let's go up, needy sinners all, to the temple of God, humbly confessing our sins, saying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" (Lk. 18:13) Let's together confess our one true Christian faith in the Triune God of our salvation, and glorify God with our mouths and hearts for all the great good He's done for us, does for us and will do for us. Amen. The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. Amen.
