WHERE ARE YOU HEADED???



Dear Servant of Christ,

The following devotional in "Our Daily Bread" provides some food for thought.

What determines our direction in life? I once heard an answer to that question in a surprising place: a motorcycle training course. Some friends and I wanted to ride, so we took a class to learn how. Part of our training dealt with something called target fixation.

"Eventually," our instructor said, "you're going to face an unexpected obstacle. If you stare at it—if you target fixate—you'll steer right into it. But if you look above and past it to where you need to go, you can usually avoid it." Then he added, "Where you're looking is the direction you are going."

That simple but profound principle applies to our spiritual lives, too. When we "target fixate"—focusing on our problems or struggles—we almost automatically orient our lives around them. However, **Scripture encourages us to look past our problems to the One who can help us with them**. In Psalm 121:1, we read, "I lift up my eyes to the mountains—where does my help come from?" The psalm then answers, "My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth . . . **The Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore.**"

Sometimes our obstacles can seem insurmountable. But God invites us to look to Him to help us wee beyond our troubles instead of letting them dominate our perspective.

Peace to you, Ron I lift up my eyes to the mountains—where does my help come from? My help comes from the Lord, the Maker of heaven and earth.

He will not let your foot slip—He who watches over you will not slumber; indeed, He who watches over Israel will neither slumber no sleep.



The Lord watches over you—the Lord is your shade at your right hand; the sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon by night.

The Lord will keep you from all harm—He will watch over your life; the Lord will watch over your coming and going both now and forevermore.

Psalm 121

Is the *Book of the Revelation* a mystery to you? Have you wished you could understand it? Perhaps you have hesitated to delve into it because you could not grasp the meaning of its strange language and symbols. The Revelation to John , the last book in the Bible, abounds with symbols: trumpets, scrolls, beasts, wings, plagues, white robes, and crowns. Can this book really speak to US?



Esther Onstad's book, "Courage for Today, Hope for Tomorrow," is an excellent Bible study on the Revelation. The author explains the symbolism that depicts the conflict between God and Satan and the victory of God's people. The focus of the Revelation is the victorious Jesus Christ who vanquishes every enemy and who will bring a new heaven and a new earth. Reread that bold type again because that *IS* the bottom line for all believers.

We look at the world, we read the news, and shake our heads and become discouraged. So, what better way to begin a new year than with hope and courage both of which are found only in a risen, ascended, victorious Savior.

We continue our study of this book through February.
