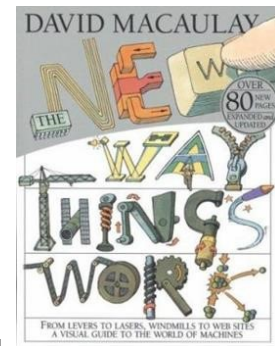

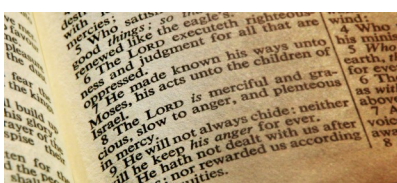
The Way The Bible Works

Dear Servants of the Christ,

Last winter my wife ordered a used copy of the book, “The New-Way Things Work.” She had read about this book and thought it would be interesting. Both of us are in the process of reading about various inventions (there’s a lot there!). Topics include the grand piano; manual typewriter; twin-rotor helicopter; self-winding watch; remote control; sewing machine; the zipper; toilet tank and the list goes on and on. Thousands of things that we use, some of which we use daily. Yet we do not give them a passing thought. But the impact on our lives is huge (the toilet tank alone is a mechanism we do not want to do without).



How Things Work is a phrase that can be applied to the Word of God, the Bible. From beginning to end, the story of God’s plan and love for His people tell us how things work, how they should work, what happens when they don’t work. And just as any invention involves instructions about what it does and how it should work and how to “assemble” the item, so the Bible gives us a “blueprint” of what we need, how things work, what are the results when we “follow directions.” I see three “biggies.”



How Things Work: the Bible calls us to REMEMBER.

It begins in Genesis when God tells Noah that the rainbow will help him **REMEMBER** the covenant God made with the people of the earth. The Psalms repeatedly proclaim, “God will (has) **REMEMBERED** His covenant with Abraham.” Upon entering the promised land, Joshua pauses the Israelites and says, “**REMEMBER**, God promised to bring you to a land flowing with mild and honey.” When the people sinned and turned from God, the prophets were sent to proclaim, “**REMEMBER** the Lord from afar, and let Jerusalem come to your mind.” And some of the final words of Jesus to His disciples told them, “But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your **REMEMBRANCE** all that I said to you.” (next pg.)

Things “work” in our lives when we **REMEMBER** Who God is, what He has done, what He has promised. Read the Bible; that’s how things work!!!!

How Things Work: the Bible calls us to be RENEWED. Renewal: We face the need for this every day. You’ve been working in the garden or mowing the lawn. You are hot, drained, limp. Then you drink that cold glass of water. You are hydrated and renewed. You’ve been working for six hours straight; no break. And now, no energy. You comment that you “are done for the day.” Then you sit down to a good meal and, voila. You are renewed to work a couple more hours. Or think of how a good night’s sleep renews you for another day. We have all experienced these “renewals.” Our lives “work” when we are **RENEWED** by the Word of God; that *is* just how things work! King David knew this. Psalm 51 says, “Create in me a clean heart, O God, and **RENEW** a right spirit within me.” St. Paul reiterates this thought in Romans 12:2, “Do not be conformed to this world but be transformed by the **RENEWAL** of your mind.” Call it a second chance, call it a lift in spirits, call it re-energized, call it re-focusing on what is important and productive. That **RENEWAL** only comes through God’s Word, so Read the Bible; that’s how things work!!!!



How Things Work: the Bible calls us to REJOICE. A month ago America celebrated Memorial Day. Either in person or watching the news on television, I saw more rejoicing and joy than I had seen in over a year. Whether sitting at a restaurant, lounging on a beach or riding a bike, whether picnicking with friends or visiting relatives, America was REJOICING at being outside, attending events, being with others, not wearing a mask!!! But note: the rejoicing was based on being able to do what you want; on positive circumstances, on freedom from limitations. And there is nothing wrong with that. But how things work for Christians is that **REJOICING** is not based on positive circumstances—though those certainly occur— but on a positive relationship with our Creator. **REJOICING** comes from knowing “the Lord is my Shepherd; I shall not want.” In fact, **REJOICING** often takes place in the midst of suffering. Again from St. Paul in Romans 5, “We **REJOICE** in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope . . .” Acts 16 records that when Paul and Silas were in prison, they started singing songs of praise at midnight! **REJOICING!** How does life work for a Christian? By **REJOICING**, and we learn how by reading the Bible!!!



I’ll be glad to let you borrow my book on “How Things Work.” It really is interesting. But if you want your life to work, just open your Bible and read. **REMEMBER**, be **RENEWED**, and **REJOICE**. It really does work!!!

Plan to attend and marvel how God ordinarily works in our daily circumstances

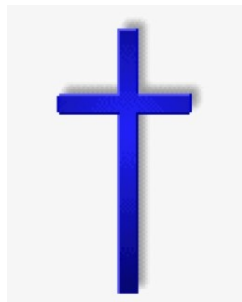

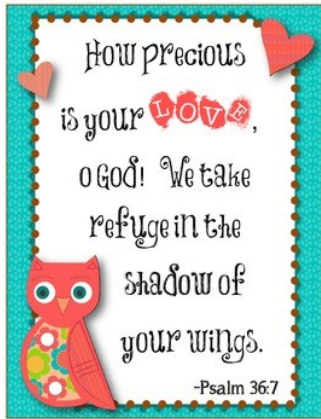
MISSION ENDOWMENT SUNDAY
