# The Pulpit and Pen



#### Giving Thanks

This month we celebrate Thanksgiving. It is generally believed that the first Thanksgiving was celebrated in 1621 by the Pilgrims. To share the occasion, they invited the Wampanoag Indians to the feast, although it was not much of a feast by today's standards. That celebration occurred in what became Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Another possibility places the first Thanksgiving right here in Florida. One University of Florida professor claimed that in 1565 the Spanish navy celebrated their arrival in the new world by offering thanks to God and having a feast in what later became St. Augustine. The Timucuan Indians were invited by the Spanish commander to celebrate with them.

It is believed that the Pilgrims celebrated their Thanksgiving with a meal of freshly harvested food that had been grown after their arrival in North America. Much of that food included staples that had been supplied by the Indians.

On the other hand, the Spanish settlers of St. Augustine ate what was left of the supplies that they had brought with them to the new world including stale biscuits, garbanzo stew, and pork. The Indians supplied meat that had been caught locally such as alligator, venison, turkey, and seafood. Not much has changed there; people still come to Florida expecting good food.

Just downriver from St. Augustine, French Huguenots celebrated Thanksgiving a year earlier in 1564 at Fort Caroline. The Huguenots were celebrating the establishment of their settlement in what later became Jacksonville. However, there was little to celebrate soon thereafter as the Spanish navy massacred the French only a few days later.

Texas claims an earlier celebration near Canyon in 1541. That occasion was to mark the victory by the Spanish conquistador Coronado. It was led by a Catholic priest, Juan de Padilla.

Unfortunately, what the Florida and Texas celebrations lacked was a direct connection to English-speaking settlers in the new world. Giving thanks to God for health, safe travels, a good harvest, or victory in war was nothing new. Such observances of thanksgiving have been around for millennia and are quite biblical, but they have no connection to the modern American holiday of Thanksgiving. While the Pilgrim holiday served as a model for today's celebration, there is no direct connection to that celebration either.

The first truly American celebration of Thanksgiving occurred in 1777. General George Washington called for a national day of thanksgiving in celebration of victory over the British at the Battle of Saratoga. Washington again called for a national day of thanksgiving in 1789 to mark the end of the Revolutionary War.

Following that declaration, several presidents after Washington called for similar days of thanksgiving to mark various occasions when God had blessed the nation. However, it was not until Lincoln officially proclaimed a national day of thanksgiving on the fourth Thursday of November in 1863 that the official holiday of Thanksgiving was established.

The one thing that each of these various celebrations by Pilgrims, Spanish, French, and Americans all have in common is giving thanks to Almighty God for His blessings. Since its establishment as a day of thanks, Thanksgiving has become associated with football championships, parades, and turkeys. We may give a cursory nod to God while saying grace over the meal, but for the most part our nation has forgotten God's blessings. This year let's give God more than a short prayer to thank Him for what He has done because taking God for granted may have devastating consequences in the near future. We can thank God for blessings or blame ourselves for judgment.
