Dear Families.

On Tuesday 29th October I attended a conference in Bairnsdale and listened to an amazing woman by the name of Susan McLean. Susan began her career with the Victoria Police in the early 1990's and was one of the first police officers called out to a school for an incident of bullying online using the internet. The internet was a very new space in that time and Susan, like most of her colleagues had no idea about how to navigate and use computers let alone the internet. As she was one of the youngest in the station she was tasked with finding a resolution to the problem. This first contact began a career culminating in her being recognised as Australia's number one expert regarding online safety for children and young adults. Susan trained with the FBI and served with VicPoI for many years before beginning a consulting company. She is an advisory to many government departments and has had major input into a number of online and cybersafety resources and is genuinely interesting to listen to.



School Closure Days

School Council has approved two School Closure Days this term. The dates are Monday November 11th and Monday December 9th. The focus of these days will be building teacher capacity in teaching writing, understanding our local Koorie history and sharing student needs for 2020 transition.

Weed Warriors' Coastcare Grant Lunchtime Program

The first stage of our Weed Warriors' Lunchtime Program concluded last week when the Bridal Creeper Leafhoppers, bred at school, were released in the Eagle Point Flora Fauna Reserve. Congratulations to our eighteen weed warriors from Rooms 5, 6 and 7, who successfully conducted a scientific biological control program. Under the guidance from local environmentalist, Tom Crook, Mrs Duncan and Mrs Simpson, the students replanted bridal creeper from the reserve into pots to sustain the leafhoppers in the tank, plotted a control site in the reserve and participated in environmental walks. The release of the leafhoppers marked the end of the breeding process and the leafhoppers should begin to make an impact on the bridal creeper by mid-2020. Thank you to Tom for his expertise, enthusiasm and support and we look forward to continuing our partnership via the Weed Warriors' Program next year.



Swimming

Please remember that our school swimming program begins on Wednesday 13th November. It would be a great idea to ensure all students have bathers and they still fit from last summer. It is recommended that students wear goggles in the pool, but they are not provided for the students. Girls must wear either a one piece bathing suit or a rash vest or t-shirt over 2 piece bathers. Before swimming please ensure that bathers, towels and goggles are all clearly marked with each student's name so they can be returned if they are misplaced at the pool.

Choice Theory Professional Learning

As you are aware, Eagle Point Primary School has adopted Choice Theory as a model for staff and students to strive for success and understand quality learning. All staff members who work at Eagle Point Primary School receive four days of training prior to the beginning of the school year. The training assists them with understanding the common language of the school and the theory behind the systems we have in place for all students. Over the past years we have encouraged parents to join in the training and we are able to offer places again for the 2020 training. The full cost of training is \$800 per person but the school can offer up to four places at a cost of \$400 each. Please contact Anna if you would like more information or to book a place.


