"Our Father who is in heaven..."

Look at the special name given to us for God: *Abba¹*. Jesus's special relationship with the Father is being transmitted to us in his instruction on prayer. He is declaring that we have to ability and opportunity to know the *Father* just as *he knows the Father*. What a precious gift! Furthermore, our *heavenly Father* is not remote or distant. Heaven's expansive realm collides with our earthly realm continuously. As such, we can experience a taste of God's heavenly glory in our prayerful communion with him.

⁷ "And when you are praying, do not use meaningless repetition as the Gentiles do, for they suppose that they will be heard for their many words. ⁸ So do not be like them; for your Father knows what you need before you ask Him.

⁹ "Pray, then, in this way:

'Our Father who is in heaven, Hallowed be Your name.

¹⁰ Your kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

¹¹ Give us this day our daily bread.

¹² And forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors.

¹³ And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from evil. [For Yours is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever. Amen.']

¹⁴ For if you forgive others for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. ¹⁵ But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions.

For we ourselves also forgive everyone who is indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation."

¹ "Abba" is the Aramaic term for "father". It is derived from the Hebrew "Ab", which also means "father".
