We are now in the season of Lent. We began with Ash Wednesday last week with a great soup supper followed by a tremendous service. We had an amazing attendance, **91**, **for Ash Wednesday!** Lent is such a significant season of the year. We prepare our hearts as we approach the sorrow of our Crucified Jesus, his Passion, and **Jesus' glorious Resurrection** as our Risen Lord and Savior!

Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday, the day before Easter Sunday. The season prepares us for the joy of Easter Sunday.

Lent has become a time for penitence for all Christians. Because Sundays are always little Easters, the penitential spirit of Lent is lessened for the joyful expectation of the Resurrection. **Holy Week is the final week of Lent**, beginning with Passion/Palm Sunday and concluding with Holy Saturday. During these days, we focus on the final days of Jesus' suffering and death.

The important thing to remember about the Lenten season is this: This season is for you, as it is for me. I hope we will take this personally and with devotion. THIS SEASON IS OUR TIME TO RENEW AND DEEPEN OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS, OUR CRUCIFIED AND RISEN LORD.

We can do that through our personal devotions (you can access the Upper Room Devotional at upperroom.org), in our Sunday worship, and the special worship opportunities we have. Our Easter Cantata is Palm Sunday, April 5. Maundy Thursday Communion is April 9, and Good Friday worship is April 10. Easter Sunday is April 12.

I hope to see you Sunday!

Notes from Larry McCord





... when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord Acts 3:19

Have you ever thought about all the songs that have the word "spring" or references to springtime in their titles and/or lyrics?

"It Might As Well Be Spring" from the musical <u>State Fair</u>
"Younger Than Springtime" from the Broadway musical <u>South Pacific</u>
"Spring Fever" from <u>Girl Happy</u> (Elvis)

<u>Rite of Spring</u>, a ballet by Stravinsky

<u>Appalachian Spring</u>, a ballet by Copland

These are, of course, but a few and the trend stretches back to the earliest days of music. One of the examples of musical storytelling I have my music appreciation students listen to is the "Spring" concerto, part of <u>The Four Seasons</u> by Vivaldi of the Baroque era, which most of you would recognize immediately, even if you didn't know the title. This composition has an accompanying poem that speaks of the birds singing, babbling brook and fearsome thunderstorms.

In 1975, Kurt Kaiser put out a new song titled, "Bring Back the Springtime," which has since been recorded by numerous artists, including Dale Evans on an album with Kaiser conducting and producing. A true example of the often seen bumper sticker, "I wasn't born in Texas, but I got here as quick as I could!", Kaiser was born in Chicago but moved to Waco, TX, the home of Word Music Publishing, in 1959. Thus began a career that would produce over 300 original songs and collaboration with Ralph Carmichael on numerous youth musicals. Kaiser's music had such an impact on contemporary Christian music that he was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame and received a Lifetime Achievement Award from ASCAP.

"Bring Back the Springtime" has been included in hymnals (including <u>Sing and Celebrate</u> and <u>The Hymnal for Worship and Celebration</u>) and has been arranged for choirs and other ensembles. In Isaiah 28, the prophet speaks of how God wished to bring refreshment and rest to His people but was pushed away. Likewise, Peter, preaching after the healing of the lame man outside the temple, tells the people to turn to God so that they may experience the refreshing presence of the Lord. As any botanist could explain, when trees appear dormant and dead to us, the sap has simply not risen up into the tree because of the season. In our spiritual lives, though we may feel dead and no longer in touch with God, His Spirit is still present within and is ready to rise and bring healing to the whole person. Anyone who has truly walked with God can testify to "the dark night of the soul" which may be caused by wandering or rebellion on our part or may simply be a season through which we must travel. Kaiser's song and scripture remind us to pray for God to "bring back the springtime" to our souls.



Stephen Ministry at FUMCRO

Stephen Ministry is a lay caring ministry in our congregation. Stephen Ministers are equipped and empowered to provide one-to-one, Christcentered care to "care receivers" who are facing a crisis in life, such as grief, divorce, serious illness, unemployment, hospitalization, spiritual crises, or other life difficulties.

Pastors are always on the "front lines" of care, but there are many needs for ongoing, one-to-one care that pastors cannot effectively meet by themselves. That is where Stephen Ministers help, meeting faithfully with care receivers for about an hour each week for as long as there is a need. All communication is kept confidential. The identity of those receiving care and what takes place in each relationship remain private.

Stephen Ministers participate in 50 hours of training sessions to learn about providing emotional and spiritual care and support to both congregation members and nonmembers alike. In addition, Stephen Ministers participate in supervision groups and continuing education sessions.

A foundational part of the training is learning to listen to care receivers as well as processing feelings, maintaining boundaries, assertive communication, praying, and sharing Scripture. A key part of Stephen Ministers' care is that they rely on God for results, not themselves. Stephen Ministers are the caregivers; God is the "curegiver."

FUMCRO is fortunate to have six Stephen Ministers and two Stephen Minister leaders. In the next few months, you will be hearing more about the FUMCRO Stephen Ministry during worship. Each Sunday, Stephen Ministers are always available for individuals who would like to have prayer. Look for the blue name badges. To learn how to become—or receive care from—a Stephen Minister, talk to Pastor Mike or one of the Stephen Leaders, Sherry Doty or Neva Ransom.
