Thank you, we look forward to doing great things together!








## **COMMUNITY EVENTS**

INDIGENOUS FOOD DEMONSTRATION

Navajo Elders from Kaibeto, Arizona were provided food boxes containing some Indigenous foods such as mutton/lamb, squash, green chili, blue

cornmeal, and juniper ash. To give the Elders different ideas for cooking the mutton and produce besides the traditional stew, we had a Navajo Chef, Denella Belin from Nella's Innovative Kreations LLC, conduct a food demonstration. Chef Denella demonstrated three unique recipes, and the biggest hit with the Elders was the Mutton Squash on Blue Corn Mush Casserole. All the Elders stated they never had paired the blue corn mush with fresh vegetables. They were all thankful for sharing and providing a different taste. You can create this delicious meal with your loved ones - just follow the recipe below!

## INDIGENOUS RECIPE MUTTON SOUASH ON BLUE CORN MUSH CASSEROLE

#### **INGREDIENTS**

- 1lb mutton, cubed
- 3 squash, cubed
- 1 whole cabbage, strips
- 1 onion, strips
- 1 tbsp Paprika
- 1 tbsp onion powder
- 1 tbsp black pepper
- 1 cup water

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Cook blue corn mush to a firm consistency following the traditional steps in making your own blue mush.
- 2. Sear mutton with onions and squash.
- 3. Add spices.
- 4. Sauté cabbage strips separately until very soft.
- 5. Spread the blue corn mush at the bottom of the pan. Spread up to 1.5 inches in height.
- 6. Top with mutton, onions, and squash.
- 7. Top with the sautéed cabbage.

#### **Emergency Meal Kit**

Assorted meals include 3/4 lb entrée of pasta with meat, protein bar, powdered drink mix, candy treat. No refrigeration required. Add water when ready to eat and the product will self-heat in 10-12 minutes.

#### Soccer Training Net (3 ft. x 2 ft.)

Does not come with a frame but can easily be attached to fencing or poles you may already have. Can also be used to store stuffed animals in a child's bedroom or as netting for cargo/activities.

## SERVICE HIGHLIGHT ANIMAL WELFARE

Did you know that PWNA offers an Animal Welfare Service? This service is designed to support organizations committed to animal welfare with the supplies they need to encourage participation in their rescue, foster, and adoption activities. To qualify for the Animal Welfare service, your organization must:

- Be a 501c3 organization that offers domestic animal adoptions
- Have a foster home network, or transport animals off the reservation to other no-kill shelters
- Have at least 1 year of experience working with reservation animals
- Preferably have a focus on the rescue of animals versus control of the animal population
- Provide a report with sign-out sheets at the end of a 90-day service period

With incentive items such as pet food, collars, leashes, bowls, treats, blankets, and more, you can encourage your community to adopt, become foster families, or volunteer to help transport animals to other no-kill shelters. You may also receive personal hygiene items for your volunteers. The Animal Welfare service supports recurring spay/neuter and vaccination services through grants. For one-time spay/neuter or vaccination clinics, you may request incentives under the Community Events service. If you know of an organization that may benefit from the Animal Welfare service, have them give our office a call.
