Each year, PWNA's American Indian Education Fund awards scholarships to American Indian/Alaska Native and Native Hawaiian undergraduate and graduate students attending accredited colleges throughout the U.S. Along with a scholarship, all awarded students receive care packages for fall, winter and holiday support, a birthday card and a graduation gift (when applicable). So far this year, we've shipped the Welcome to School and Holiday boxes to 122 scholarship students, with useful items such as school supplies, snacks/treats, toiletries, games and household necessities. It's our way of letting our scholars know we're rooting for them! And as always, we love the photos and thank you notes we get from them!









Spread the word: Apply for an AIEF scholarship if you are:

- Native American, Alaska Native, or Native Hawaiian (student or a parent must be enrolled and have documentation)
- Attending an accredited 2- or 4-year college/university or technical/vocational school within the U.S. <u>and</u> attending school full-time for both the full school year (Fall & Spring semester)



Scholarship Deadline:

AIEF Undergraduate and Graduate 2020-2021 scholarship applications must be postmarked by April 4, 2020. However, we encourage all applicants to submit before March 1, 2020 to receive an extra point toward their overall score.

Emergency Preparedness

At the Black Hills Powwow-He Sapa Wacipi Na Oskate on October 11-13, PWNA staffed an information booth to help raise awareness about Emergency Preparedness in tribal communities, and Pennington County Emergency Management and American Red Cross staffed tables to provide information on emergency services and disasters. Many PWNA partners and members of communities we serve attended, as well as Native Americans and non-Natives residing in Rapid City. PWNA emphasized the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) trainings that we use to support tribal communities, and we look forward to doing more adult and youth training in the future. Our booth was very interactive, and across the three tables, 200 people signed in for a successful exchange of critical information with communities working to be more prepared when emergencies or disasters strike.

In early November, Joe Tyon participated in *Adult Mental Health First Aid Instructor Training*, which was hosted by the National Council for Behavioral Health. After their intensive training, a written test and a 30-minute presentation, Joe is now a certified Adult Mental Health First Aid Instructor. This will allow him to conduct mental health first aid training for our emergency preparedness partners and their communities in 2020. Patricia Roth of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate on the Lake Traverse Reservation will be attending the same training next year.

Going forward into 2020, PWNA will be doing more focus groups, 1st Aid/CPR training, CERT training and Mental Health First Aid training with tribal communities. We look forward to continuing to learn and grow with our partners, community members, consultants and trainers, with the support of Margaret A. Cargill Philanthropies for emergency preparedness.
